Crimson Ridge HOA Letter from the President - 2023

Dear Crimson Ridge HOA Member,

I hope this mailing finds you well and that you are enjoying the holidays with friends and family.

As I mentioned in last year's letter, we had a late 2021 incident that caused a separation from our HOA management provider. The board agreed to start 2022 with self-management which included taking over HOA management duties, day-to-day operations, reducing HOA Management costs, while doing it better. Dues were collected with no delinquencies, pool season had no complaints, trash was collected, yard work along 47th street was completed, the fountains fountained, social events were held, financials were more transparent, and decisions and actions were swifter. Two separate board member comments about 2022 that stuck with me include "Since I have been with the board (8+ years), I don't think that we have ever had a year with no [dues] delinquencies even though we had professional management." And "I'm not sure what we were paying an HOA management firm for all these years.

Overall, the HOA saved somewhere between \$15K - \$18K by doing it ourselves. These savings allowed us to weather the 2022 storm of inflation and surcharges without dipping into the reserves. The board reviewed the budget for 2023 and we are keeping the dues at \$550 per member. If you see a board member or know one, please take a moment to thank them for their additional effort to keep our costs lean and thus a few more dollars in your pocket.

Looking ahead, the major initiative for 2023 will be modernizing the declarations to include changes driven by members' requests and feedback. Each member (each house owner) will be issued a ballot and will be able to vote to approve or deny. Per Johnson County each ballot will need to be notarized and we will need 75%-member approval (231 of 307-member ballot approval) to modify the declarations.

As a summary, these changes address:

- Allowing solar panels within ARC guidelines
- Requiring rental properties to hire professional yard maintenance services
- Specifying trash and recycling bin curb times and storage
- Adding approval of fixed outdoor recreational equipment beyond basketball goals and playsets.

The actual ballot will have more specific language of the changes for your review. When we have the final ballot and guidance from legal counsel, the board will communicate a process to make submitting your ballot as simple as possible. This is a big initiative and I am sure there will be questions and concerns which will be addressed as we progress. Please stay tuned.

Finally, each January, the board holds an annual meeting for our members. At this meeting our members can get updates, exchange ideas, ask questions, and nominate and elect the board of directors that represent our neighborhood for the next year. If you would like to serve on the board to guide our neighborhood for the future, please nominate yourself (or others). Please contact me or Scott Heeke in advance or attend the meeting to submit your nomination. The meeting will be held via Zoom on January 30, 2023, at 7:00 PM. Zoom link details will be posted on www.eneighbors.com about a week in advance as well as e-mailed to all our members through payhoa.com.

TIPS FOR SAVING ON YOUR NATURAL GAS BILL

Turn Down Your Thermostat

You can save as much as 3% for each degree that you turn your thermostat.

Take Care of Your Furnace

Have your furnace cleaned and checked out every year to keep it running at peak performance.

Let The Heat Circulate

Check your furniture, curtains and drapes and area rugs to make sure they are not blocking heat registers and vents. If you have a ceiling fan, use it to push the warm air down from the ceiling.

Keep The Cold Out

Close your blinds or drapes when it gets dark outside to help cut heat loss through your windows at night.

Cook Smart

If you cook with gas, adjust the flame to fit your pans. Opening the oven door unnecessarily can cause a drop of up to 50 degrees in the oven temperature, so don't open the oven door unless you have to.

Turn Down The Tank

You can reduce your energy consumption by turning your hot water tank down to 120 degrees. For every 10-degree reduction in temperature, you can save between 3% and 5% on your water heating costs.

Think Before You Wash and Dry Clothes

Wash and dry only full loads of laundry and use the cold water setting on your washer. If you have to wash a small load, use the appropriate water-level setting. Consider using a clothes rack or indoor clothesline to dry clothes. If you do use your dryer, be sure to clean the lint screen in the dryer after every load to improve air circulation for more efficient clothes drying and to prevent fire hazards.
